

ANNUAL REPORT 2024



What a fantastic first year! Who could have guessed how busy and successful we would be, when looking back just 13 months ago. The bowling centre was due to close on September 3rd 2023, which would have had serious negative effects on the 200 existing bowlers. There was simply no indoor replacement sport available to satisfy their social and physical needs; it would have been life changing for them, and not for the better.

Back in July 2023 the bowling centre was given two months' notice of closure. It had to close, and no hope of any other outcome was possible, or so it seemed. A meeting of bowlers, councillors and Etherow Trustees was hastily arranged. The meeting was held with about 100 people in attendance. Out of the gloom, hope appeared and from that hope came passion and determination. To save the bowling, the only way forward was to simultaneously save the building, the two things had to go hand in hand. A passionate vision of bowling expansion was delivered, the impossible now seemed possible, and the room began to buzz. Trustees and the bowlers were on board and seven bowlers and two trustees stepped forward to set the wheels in motion. Discussions were held, plans were put in place and actions were taken.

Roll forward to September 3rd 2023. The doors were opened on a new era for bowlers and the Etherow Centre Charitable Trust. Together the dream had become a reality.

Since opening these doors, we now have approximately 400 Etherow members and roughly 500 bowlers in total have played here. To achieve this, we have successfully introduced Short Mat bowling and eight brand new sets of world class playing equipment. This has attracted some of the world's best bowlers to Etherow. We have also managed to fill every existing Long Mat league plus introduced two additional Long Mat leagues. It is pleasing to see how so many of the Short Mat bowlers have now taken to Long Mat bowling. In time we expect that many more of the Long Mat bowlers will have a go and come to appreciate the technicalities of the Short Mat game that is so popular with roughly 100,000 players around the world.

Our growth in numbers has been fantastic and I anticipate that our membership numbers will continue to grow to maybe 500 in 2025. The most amazing thing though is that I anticipate that the number of bowlers that will play at our venue in the next 12 months will double to 1,000 in total. That new total has been made possible mainly due to the introduction and adoption of Etherow IBC by both the Greater Manchester SMBA and the Stockport IBL as their home venue for county matches. In total there will be 13 county matches played at Etherow with each visiting team bringing roughly 24 players, which is about 300 new bowlers in total. Both Greater Manchester and Stockport will also be holding various National qualifier and championship events here.

Etherow IBC itself has also entered two teams in the local Stockport Short Mat bowling league. That will mean roughly 16 local team matches and knockouts will be held here at Etherow, mostly on nights throughout the winter season. Maybe a further 100 visitors in total, meaning that my estimate of 1,000 bowlers in the next 12 months could easily be achieved.

To manage this growth, a great deal of time, effort and money has been invested into our building. The whole building and playing facilities have vastly improved in appearance and cleanliness. This is just the start for the Etherow Centre, and improvements will continue over the next few years. Ideas and plans are many and varied. We are aiming high, and our intention is to make the Etherow Centre an attraction that not just bowlers, but the whole of Broadbottom and the surrounding areas can be proud of.

What we have achieved so far is being talked about nationally and throughout Europe in bowling communities. I am proud to say that in January our Etherow Centre will be hosting two friendly Short Mat matches. The first will be the England Under 21's team vs Etherow / Greater Manchester on January 25th. The second game will be England Ladies vs Etherow / Greater Manchester on January 26th. Everyone can be sure that there will be high quality bowling on display and a very warm welcome will be extended to both visiting England teams.

Helping to raise our profile further, we will be hosting the "Short Mat players Tour" in March 2025. This event will see 32 of the world's best bowlers playing for the title of "Champion of Champions" in the inaugural "Tournament Players Championship". This event will be held on 15th & 16th March and streamed live by a TV company on YouTube for the whole two days. These top-class players from around Europe will also be playing for a total SMPT prize fund in excess of £10,000. As I said, Etherow is becoming well know and talked about by bowlers throughout England and Europe. Closer to home, we are very proud that we have also held two of our own Charity Long Mat events. In January 2024 we held our own event in support of "NHS Charities Together" and in March 2024 we held another of our own events in support of the "MacMillan Cancer Charity". With the support of the bowlers and the Etherow Centre, these events raised £500 for each of these worthy causes. Our thanks go to Gerry Thackrey for sponsoring both of these charity days.

Other events last year included a two day triples event we called the "High Peak Cup", which saw many players visiting from Essex, Cambridge and the midlands. It was a great success and virtually all of the visitors are looking forward to returning again for the same event this year. We also had a Christmas Long Mat knockout competition. This was the first Long Mat knockout event held at Etherow which proved very successful and was played with a great Christmas spirit. To prove that bowls is for all, this event was won by two players with an age difference of 50 years. Young or old, we all enjoy our bowls.

Another competitive and fun improvement we made last year was to introduce an end of season knockout for all of our Long Mat leagues. This was another great set of games enjoyed by all who took part and these knockouts will continue every year.

Here we are then, 13 months after almost certain closure. We have not allowed that to happen and will continue to improve all the time. Etherow is now one of the most successful and happy places to be, evidenced by a room full of smiles at all times with plenty of friends playing bowls and socialising together. I personally feel that I have hundreds of new friends, and I look forward to my games with you all. Together we have turned Etherow into a wonderful place to be, we can all be very proud of who and what we are. Next, I want to mention our fantastic team of office volunteers. Each day the office is manned by friendly volunteers that make day to day bowls run smoothly. These people are also your bowling friends. If you feel you would like to assist these friends in helping Etherow IBC flourish, just speak any one of the office volunteers.

I would like to personally thank our wonderful Etherow Team that form part of the bowls committee. Working with these people for 15 months now has been an honour. It is a privilege to class these people as personal close friends now. Their time, effort and diligence has been magnificent. All have had the same goal, which has simply been to make Etherow the best place it can be. The team act as one and never for personal gain, all as volunteers with Etherow in their hearts. It's a great team and if you ever feel that you would like to contribute to the Etherow success story, please stand tall.

To each and every one of you that are now members of the Etherow Chariatable Trust, thank you very much from myself and on behalf of everyone involved.

Keep bowling and smiling, the two go hand in hand.

Gwyn Davies, Director & Trustee Treasurer

Some background about the Trust.

The Trust since its establishment in 1985 has acted solely as landlord to provide recreational and therapeutic riding classes and furthers its charitable purposes for the public benefit through the provision of facilities hosting a range of sports and leisure activities available to able bodied and disabled people, covering a wide age range and geographical area.

Our primary tenant is Tameside MBC and they have previously provided the sports leisure activities latterly via Active Tameside. The riding classes were first provided by Kingfisher and following its dissolution then Haywill Animal Rescue. That organisation has since ceased to operate in March 2024. A situation which the Trust have now to address.

The Trust accounting year is 1st December to 30th November. In the last audited accounts to 30 Nov 2023 I can report the following extract:

Financial review

Income totalled £56,592 (2022: £32,614) and total expenditure was £61.456 (2022: £46,920)

Leaving a deficit of £4,864(including a deprecation charge of £15,462). New sources of funds to cover future maintenance projects continue to be explored. Restricted reserves at the year end were £37,233. The increases in figures reflects the impact of the Trust involvement with the Indoor Bowling centre from 2/09 providing income of £22,813 for the 3 month period to 30/11 with costs of £13,680 excluding utility costs of £11,875 and maintenance costs.

The Committee considers the outlook for the Indoor Bowling Centre remains optimistic with an increased income in the first 12 months of operation of over 100%.

The increase comes primarily from two streams:

1) the introduction of a membership scheme

and

2) diversification with the introduction of the short mat game which utilizes the firstclass level bowling surface used by our members and other short mat bowling clubs who can hire our facility for a reasonable hourly charge.

But is also the result of increased usage of the improved facility with the support of our growing membership.

Unaudited figures are as follows:

From the Square financial reporting system we have an income for the period 2/09/23 to 31/09/24 of £60,694.14 supplemented by Room hire fees of £1,640 Totalling £62,334.

Costs amount to £ 57,949 and include:

There are other costs shared with the Trust such as bank charges which are not included.

For accounting purposes our accounting year will be the same as the Trust and the accounts will be prepared by Community Accountancy Services based in Beswick Manchester.

Please note that much work has been carried out by volunteers. Some has been organised by the Trust such as the dilapidations which were reimbursed by Tameside MBC or dealt with by our sponsors who have made significant contributions to refurbish the Centre.

The lease is still held by Tameside MBC and meaningful negotiations have yet to take place. The Trust have now appointed Chartered Surveyors to carry out a rent review. Their report we hope will act as a catalyst to promote discussion and resolution of this matter. Legal advice is being obtained.

I would like to remind members that inappropriate behaviour is not acceptable, and the committee will monitor the behaviour of members and take appropriate action should a member transgress the ETIQUETTE considered required of them when playing at the Centre as outlined below.

The Importance of Etiquette

Greet your opponents and fellow players

Before the game begins, take the time to introduce yourself and shake hands with your opponents and fellow players. This small gesture shows respect, sportsmanship, and a willingness to engage in a fair and enjoyable competition.

When greeting your opponents, it is customary to address them by their names and offer a warm smile. This helps to establish a personal connection and foster a sense of camaraderie among players. Remember, indoor bowls is not just about the competition, but also about building relationships and forming lasting friendships

Observe silence when players are on the mat

One of the fundamental aspects of indoor bowls etiquette is maintaining silence when a player is on the mat and about to deliver their bowl. The mat is the designated area where a player stands to deliver their shot, and it requires utmost concentration and focus.

Rule Changes:

Modification of Rule C1 from:

Clean, flat-soled indoor footwear must be worn whilst on the green. Ideally, footwear produced by recognised bowls manufacturers should be worn, centre management can provide a list of retailers that sell such footwear.

To:

Clean, flat-soled indoor footwear produced by recognised bowls manufacturers must be worn whilst on the green.

Modification of Rule J3a from:

Game Win: 3 Points **To:** Game Win: 2 Points

Addition of Rule 18:

Electronic devices e.g., mobile phones, pagers, smart watches etc, in active mode are not allowed on the rink and calls must not be taken during a game without prior agreement from both team captains.

Removal of Rule D1 & D2:

D1: Daytime league games are to be played over a maximum of 16 ends or as many as can be completed within two hours, if this is less than 16.

D2: Evening league games are to be played over a maximum of 13 ends or as many as can be completed within one and half hours, if this is less than 13.
